Coming of Age Worship Service: June 11



Message from Jan Hutchinson, President

Back in the 19th century, Thoreau could say, "Time is but a stream I go a-fishing in..." Now in the 21st century, it seems that instead of a gentle trout stream, time has become a whitewater current we are riding as on a rollercoaster. We're wearing our life preservers and clinging to the gunwales, but it's a perilous ride.

My long-deceased grandparents and parents commented often about how much faster time moves later in life. Now, as a septuagenarian, I'm sure that age has something to do with my sense of time's rapidity, but it is also quite obvious that our entire culture and much of the world have sped up along with the exponential "advancements" in technology. We now move from place to place faster than Thoreau could have imagined. Thoughts and communications almost instantaneously circle the globe. The question remains: What has been gained and what has been lost with all this speed, these screens, this techno chatter? I blame the Internet and the often-shallow group-think of social media for our current political chaos and the dangerous Twit-in-Chief.

Juliet Schor wrote about the present: "Millions of Americans have lost control of the basic rhythm of their daily lives. They work too much, eat too quickly, socialize too little, drive and sit in traffic for too many hours, don't get enough sleep, and feel harried too much of the time." When our lives become fried, frazzled, and frenetic, it takes conscious intent to escape the racket and the swirl. Let's strive to take back our time. And the children — can a child who is never given time and freedom to wander alone in the woods ever learn to really see?

Has it all been downhill since the Greatest Generation? I wonder if any hectic generation since could produce a man like Chet Kalm. He left while we still had things to learn from him about how to live with calm dignity in this world.

What's Happening in June on the UUMSB's Social Justice Front?

Our June **Share the Plate Sunday** will take place on **June 4** for **Agricultural Ventures** (AV). Martha Page will be introducing the AV representative that Sunday who will tell us the history of their work in Berkshire County. AV is our newest Share the Plate organization and the final one representing the issue of food insecurity. Let's make them feel welcome and be as supportive as possible.

Regarding this theme of food insecurity in Berkshire County the Social Justice Team has been exploring the potential of developing a **UUMSB Community Garden** since we first began this discussion with the **Greenagers** when they came for their Share the Plate Sunday in April. The **Membership Committee** has joined us in partnership to explore this possibility and make this potential project a real team effort. We hope to bring in members of our wider Housatonic community into this discussion as we strategize about a community garden. On that point we plan on surveying our neighborhood here in Housatonic early next month to ask them what they think and might they be interested in becoming involved in such a project?

Please consider joining us on **Friday, June 16** for a potluck supper and community discussion about a **UU/Housatonic Community Garden** – having a garden right here on our own property (with some sharing from the Ramsdale Library). The community survey and invitation to this event (with some neighborhood door knocking) will take place on **Sunday, June 4**, after service. Want to join us? Reach out to Tommie, Al, Ray or Karen.

So – come one, come all on **Friday, June 16 at 6:30** to join the Membership and Social Justice folks for a community supper and discussion (in the Fellowship Room) concerning growing local! We are working on a panel of experts who will add to this discussion with their firsthand experiences of developing shared gardens. Bring a dish and join us! Watch for a flyer on the Action Table during coffee hour.

The next **Justice Team book discussion** has been set for **Sunday, June 25**, following service (bring your lunch). The book we have chosen is *Lies My Teacher Told Me* by James Loewen. Questions? Just ask Ray or Tommie.

The annual **UUA General Assembly** is scheduled for June 21 through June 25 in New Orleans. This year the theme is **Resist and Rejoice** and is labeled a **Justice GA**. Three members of our congregation are scheduled to attend – Rev Carol, Bill Young and Tommie Hutto-Blake (yes, the team from last year). We will each head in different directions during the workshops and gather at times for main events and some post talk discussion. You may remember on return last year we shared some of our GA experiences with UUMSB, and we might try that again this year. This is the annual gathering of UUs from all over our nation as well as international UU communities. If you have never experienced a UU GA (whether you are a long time UU or just found us) put a future GA on your bucket list!

What's Happening in June on the UUMSB's Social Justice Front?

The **Ware Lecture** (key note address) at GA this year is noted justice public interest lawyer **Bryan Stevenson** who wrote the acclaimed book **Just Mercy**. Bryan is the founder of the **Equal Justice Initiative** in Montgomery, Alabama and has dedicated his career to helping the poor, the incarcerated and the condemned.

Just Mercy will probably be a future shared book read for the Social Justice bookgroup in the months ahead. Consider joining us! Mr. Stevenson's work fighting poverty and challenging racial discrimination in the criminal justice system has won him numerous awards – to mention only a few - the ABA Wisdom Award for Public Service, the MacArthur Foundation Fellowship Award Prize, the ACLU National Medal of Liberty, the Ford Foundation Visionaries Award, and the NAACP Ming Award for Advocacy. He is a Harvard Law School and Harvard School of Government graduate and has been awarded 26 honorary doctorate degrees and is currently a Professor of Law at the New York University School of Law. On top of all this we hear he is a fabulous and full-spirited speaker!

Please consider joining us in this UUMSB work! The next Social Justice quarterly meeting will be held at 9am on Sunday, July 23.
